Two (post) doctoral seminars in Sweden on 27-28, and 29-30 August 2018

The law faculties at Uppsala University and Stockholm University are organizing two (post) doctoral seminars in tax law, on transfer pricing (Stockholm, 27-28 August 2018) and comparative tax law (Uppsala, 29-30 August 2018). Qualifying candidates are welcome to attend either one, or both of the seminars. It takes 40 minutes by train to travel between Stockholm and Uppsala, and Arlanda airport is conveniently located between the two cities. The seminars are free of charge and require a workload covering approximately 7,5 ECTS. An invitation with the final programs will be sent soon.

Transfer pricing: material and methodological issues (Stockholm, 27-28 August 2018)

The Law Faculty at Stockholm University organises an international seminar open to doctoral candidates and post-doctoral researchers who are working in the field of transfer pricing and closely related issues. Transfer pricing is a peculiar area of tax law, which, beyond the material aspects, raises difficult questions of method for the researchers involved in this field.

Together with prominent experts who have extensively published in the field of transfer pricing such as Prof. Yariv Brauner and Dr Giammarco Cottani, participants will be able to exchange their views and experiences on various material and methodological issues. The seminar comprises a combination of presentations from the tutors, the participants, and workshops in small groups.

Comparative tax law methodology (Uppsala, 29-30 August 2018)

We will also discuss experiences of comparative tax law research in developing international tax law and EU tax law. During the seminar, there will be possibilities to discuss comparative tax law methodology in relation to your own research topic. The seminar will be launched by Prof. Birke Häcker, professor of Comparative law, Oxford university. Several prominent professors in tax law will attend and join in on the discussions during the seminar.
